accent from Jersey she asked me to be her speaker for the night. You don't say "No" in AA, even in Texas, so they were subjected to Jersey-gobble in Abilene AA one frosty Dec. 20th in the mid Nineteen Eighties.

Years before I had spent the 1975 Christmas Day at the AA house in El Paso, Texas, while working the Sun Bowl game that was played the day after Christmas. There was a mtg. every 3rd hour that day and it helped me get through a lonely time being away from home on that Christmas.

Even across the Atlantic one can find AA in most locations, from Dublin to Moscow. My wife and I travel to Ireland regularly and have close friends in that beautiful island nation.

But the most striking aspect of sobriety in Ireland, for me, comes in our regular visits to Tralee, the little West Ireland city in County Kerry. That is where Matt Talbot comes from. There is a major road in Tralee named Matt Talbot Street.

When I first joined AA my home group was in a Catholic Church on the Atlantic Ocean shore in Long Branch, NJ. Across the street from the church was a retreat house where, twice a year, AA members came from all over the Northeast to attend a semiannual, three day, Matt Talbot retreat. So, when we visit

Ireland I make it a point of driving along Matt Talbot Street in Tralee.

I have attended AA meetings in Boston, Syracuse, Portland Me., Houston, San Francisco, Miami, South Bend, Ind., Pittsburgh, Detroit, Lexington, Ky, Kansas City, Nashville, Palm Springs, Ca., Palm Beach, Fl. and on and on. It must be noted that I also got drunk in each of the above locations in the bad old days.

What is so important to me is that no matter where I go for an AA meeting, the welcome is uniformly warm with no questions asked. I have always felt right at home just as I was walking into my original old Home Group in New Jersey.

AA is a rare and magnificent fellowship that takes to it's bosom the drunk, the long sober ones and the ones who slip. AA holds them and comforts them in the same fashion no matter where in the world you seek out a gathering of AA members.

No church, social organization, club or other group gives as genuinely warm a welcome to a stranger as you will find in AA.

Maybe that is because there really are no strangers in AA... just friends that you have not met before.

THE VASS GROUP

The Vass Group originated in 1983 at the invitation of a local minister. He invited three AA members who lived in Vass to start an AA meeting at the First Baptist Church on Old Rt. 1.

The first meeting was held in the sanctuary of the church. It was attended by three men, a prospect they were 12th Stepping and a

couple of members of the Sanford Group.

Three of the members of the Vass Group signed a note at the local bank and the old church sanctuary was fixed up with a kitchen and central heating and air conditioning to make it suitable to hold meetings.

The group originally had a closed discussion meeting on Wed. & Thurs. nights and a speaker meeting on Saturday. The format now is a closed discussion on Wednesday nights at 8.

Because of their location in the northern part of Moore County the Vass Group has members from Lee, Harnett and Chatham Counties.

The Vass group has a good sized membership but is also pleased that many members of other groups consider Vass as their 2nd home. Both members and non-members sign up to chair the weekly meetings.

Every year at their anniversary the Vass Group has an eating meeting with a special speaker. This past year they celebrated their 25th year and our own Tom I. of Moore County was the speaker. He spoke to a large audience of hungry and enthusiastic AA members.



Whether we have days, weeks or months of


sobriety, or many years, our experience will always be a tremendous source of strength and hope for others. We encourage everyone to contribute."

HISTORICAL FACTS of AA



THERE'S A SLOGAN FOR THAT !!

It doesn't take very long for a newcomer to realize that there is a "slogan" for just about every situation that might arise in recovery. We first see these sayings hanging on the walls in our meetings. We see them stuck on bumpers and we hear them quoted by old-timers.

A few of us looked at them with disdain when we first arrived to the program. We would listen with disbelief as our sponsors shared these "gems" with us when what we surely needed was REAL advice. After all, it would take much more than a simple kindergarten saying to solve the huge problems that we brought with us to A.A.

However., as we continued to hang around the rooms, soaking up the wisdom and staying sober, we found ourselves quoting and sharing these very same slogans right along with the old-timers and our sponsors.

We began to understand that

these very slogans don't just get us through a tough time or a rough patch, but they often downright save our lives.

Where did these slogans come from? Who thought up all these profound snippets of insight?

Unfortunately there is not a great deal of information about the origins of AA's slogans. Many of these slogans, as with other practices in AA, have simply been passed along verbally to other members.

It is possible that some of the slogans may have originally stemmed from the *Oxford Group Movement*, but it is difficult to narrow it down.

When a similar question was asked of GSO Archivist Frank M, in 1989 his response was:

"Your interest in the origins of 'One Day at a Time' is shared by many of us. Like hand-holding, however, it's difficult to pin-point the exact 'moment."

There is the belief that many slogans have been around since the early days of the Fellowship. In December of 1958 non-alcoholic Ruth Hock who was AA's first secretary, wrote the following in response to another question concerning slogans.

"...Bill W. and I first worked together in January 1936 when he had been sober just a little over one year and at that time

'Easy Does It,' 'Live and Let Live,' and 'First Things First,' were part of the daily conversation. They were also used in the very first drafts of the book, but probably only Bill himself could tell you where he picked them up.

As far as I'm concerned all of the above were introduced into A.A. by Bill W. himself, though not original with him. Some of these could have been used in Oxford Group meetings but there is no way to know for sure."

Bill Wilson's biography *Pass It On* also addresses this topic. On page 220 it states:

"Some 'A.A. saws' were also used as long ago as the late 1930s: 'First Things First,' 'Easy Does It,' 'Live and Let Live.' because these appear in the first edition of the Big Book (at the end of the chapter on 'The Family Afterward'), it's probable that the use of the slogans originated with Bill and that he brought them with him from Vermont – old saws with new teeth."

Regardless of the history of our slogans, I think we could all agree that they do become an important part of our recovery.

"One day at a time" we begin to rely on them to help keep us moving forward in our sobriety.

STRUCTURE OF THE FELLOWSHIP

(as represented in our Sandhills area)

HOME GROUPS

The Moore County registered Home Groups elect a GSR (General Service Rep.) and an alternate GSR and one or the other attends the quarterly District mtgs. The views and concerns of the group are presented there.

DISTRICT 52

District 52 is made up of 5 counties, Moore, Richmond, Scotland, Hoke and Lee. GSR's make up the membership & representatives are chosen from the group to attend the Area Assemblies. Officers for District 52 are elected from this group for 2 yr. terms. The offices: DCM (District Committee Member) alternate DCM, secretary and treasurer.

AREA 51

This is the final link between AA in N. C. & the world services of AA. The committee is composed of District Committee members, those from each District whom GSR's have elected to represent them. The officers are elected from this group & serve a 2 yr. term. Area assemblies are held 3 or 4 times a year and a delegate (& alternate) are elected to attend the Gen'l Sv. Conference of that year.


GENERAL SERVICE CONFERENCE

A yearly conference made up of worldwide delegates chosen from the Area assemblies. The concerns of local Home Groups finally get to be viewed and voted on at these conferences. Everyone who is a delegate has a voice and a vote.

Note: The Sandhills Intergroup is not a part of the *Structure of the Fellowship*. We are an organization formed solely to provide services for the AA community in the County of Moore. The Intergroup does not act as mediator or make any suggestions or recommendations. We have no voting privileges.

The Sandhills Intergroup provides local services that would be difficult for any one Home Group to handle...such as:
Answering Service, Website, Meeting Lists, Recording of AA speeches and uploading onto our Website, Adopt-a-Pro folders, the publication of the Newsletter 3 times a year and placing AA literature where needed.
