

#### An EPIPHANY

Early sobriety is a fragile time for many of us. It was for me. My siblings were not happy at all that I had decided to start down the AA road to recovery. The "whys and wherefores" of this are unimportant ... it's enough to say that they were very hurt and angry and the feelings were intensified when my mother died shortly after I started my journey.

Of course I was grieving too and it was difficult to accept that I needed to stay true to AA and to all its teachings. I struggled mightily with this until I was saved by an epiphany. It was then that the truth came through loud and clear!

I quickly wrote down the words that expressed how I

felt and I added to the original over the next few months.

Here is the final version. I have it framed & hanging on my wall so that I will never forget how fragile I was then and how the AA program saved me.

#### Sobriety

And the woman said "sobriety is it's own reward ... Nothing more, nothing less No promise that life would be easier ... No promise that people would like me or be kinder.

To be able to forgive me or even want to.

Just that by being sober I would be better.


My part in things would be better ...

### CARRYING THE MESSAGE

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#### GOING STRONG FOR 25 YEARS

One of my favorite AA meetings in Moore County is the "11<sup>th</sup> Step Meeting" at 11AM every Sunday in the Aberdeen building.

I decided to learn more about it and found that it has been in existence for more than a quarter of a century. One of the things that makes the meeting special for me is that several of the old-timers that were active in forming the meeting can still be found in attendance on any given Sunday morning.

The collective wisdom that these old-timers impart to the meeting is invaluable. It is one of the factors that contributes to what makes AA so great ... people

getting together to share their experiences, strength and hope.

The emphasis of the 11<sup>th</sup> Step meeting is spiritual. It opens with the St. Francis Prayer, from pg. 99 of the AA "12 x 12":

"Lord, make me a channel of thy peace - that where there is hatred, I may bring love - that where there is wrong, I may bring the spirit of forgiveness that where there is discord, I may bring harmony - that where there is error, I may bring truth - that where there is doubt, I may bring faith - that where there is despair, I may bring hope -that where there are shadows, I may bring light -that where there is sadness, I may bring joy.

Lord, grant that I may seek rather to comfort than to be comforted - to understand than to be understood - to love, than to be loved. For it is by self-forgetting that one finds. It is by forgiving that one is forgiven and it is by dying that one awakens to eternal life. Amen"

This is followed by reading of the 11<sup>th</sup> step:

"Sought through prayer and meditation to improve our conscious contact with God as we understood him, praying only for knowledge of God's will for us and the power to carry that out."

The discussion leader then spends a few minutes introducing a topic and this is followed by the remainder of the meeting in open sharing.

While not necessarily a substitute for a "regular" church service I find the "11<sup>th</sup> Step Meeting" a great means of recharging my spiritual batteries.

With its emphasis on prayer and meditation the 11<sup>th</sup> Step meeting is a good opportunity to either start or end my week in a reflective mode, focusing on how we can better conform to Gods will for us.



## TRAVELING HIGHLIGHTS



### The "Pink Church" Lighthouse Point, Florida

This past February was the 20<sup>th</sup> year that my husband and I have been joining friends in Lighthouse Point, Florida. When I first started in AA, 5½ years ago, I thought it might be a problem because this group does enjoy a social drink or two at the end of the day; but, they proved to be very supportive of me and have never made me feel out of place or uncomfortable.

However, I had never searched for AA in the area until this year ... and I am

so glad I did. I found a meeting that suited me to a "T". It's the "Spirituality Seekers" and they meet at the First Presbyterian Church (fondly referred to as the Big Pink Church) in Pompano Monday through Friday at 7 AM.

This is a small meeting, only about 6 or 8 people attending each day, and that made it very nice and comfortable for me. The meeting is held in the lobby of the church and definitely follows the "rule" that AA should never be organized... rarely did it start on time, no coffee is served and tables and chairs are put out at random.

It was a great mix of people ... Jack knows the preamble by heart and recites it at a fast clip, Ruth brings her two dogs and John and I have very similar sobriety dates. There was also a member with just 13 sober days so that kept it fresh for us.

Their format is very different from what I am used to. They read either

the Serenity Prayer or the St. Francis Prayer first and then have a five minute meditation period. (I really liked this as it gave me time to calm my mind and gather my thoughts.) Topics were from the Big Book, the 12x12 and then, once a week, it was the chair person's choice.

They really made me feel very welcome and even suggested that I make it my Home Away From Home Group on my yearly trips South. I intend to do that and can't wait for next year and my AA meeting in the "Pink Church".

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# Our ADOPT-A-PRO program opens the eyes of a world corporation

Recently one of our AA members who is the local branch manager of a world-wide organization ran into a troubling situation. One of her employees came to work drunk and, after she'd sent the employee home for the day, she contacted the Human Resources department at the main office of the corporation to see what protocol she was to follow.

Lo and behold she was amazed to find that no such protocol existed. They knew almost nothing about alcoholism and AA in particular. Although the company has been in existence longer than AA, it has never implemented a plan of action to cover these contingencies. This put our manager in an awkward position.

Then she remembered that her Home Group had **ADOPT-A-PRO** folders filled with relevant AA pamphlets and a cover letter that reads in part: "Greetings from the fellowship of Alcoholics Anonymous. You are a professional who is likely to encounter an alcoholic in crisis in one or more areas of their lives. Rapid and effective referral to AA may well have a lifechanging impact on the individual and their families. Accordingly we have compiled an "AA Referral" folder for you ...."

She sent an ADOPT-A-PRO folder to the HR department at the main office and they were overjoyed to get the information. It has set the ball rolling & they are now implementing a set of rules

and regulations that their company will adopt for future occurrences.

It just proves that, with the aid of the ADOPT-A-PRO folder, any member of AA can carry the message of recovery to all areas of the professional community.

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# SPOTLIGHT ON OUR GROUPS

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#### PRIMARY PURPOSE GROUP

AA is often described as a group of alcoholics in ACTION. With this in mind a group of AA members in Moore County formed the Primary Purpose Group. They felt that a new group was needed that emphasized ACTION.

An exploratory meeting was held in March, 1977, where the basic planning for the group was accomplished. They endeavored to have a job available for every one that would want to participate.

In order to achieve this it was decided to establish service committees as well as the usual officers that are found in most groups.

These committees are: CPC (Cooperation with the Professional Community) PI (Public Information) Correctional facilities, Treatment Facilities, Newcomers, Literature, a Newsletter and a Program Planning committee.

The first group meeting was held June 2, 1997 and was a huge success. On Mondays the group breaks into three smaller groups. These include a Closed pre-selected topic disc. Meeting and a Newcomer meeting that is Open.

Thursdays there is an Open Speaker meeting with speakers from inside and outside our community.

The service hours expended by the Group to Detox, Rehab Centers and Correctional Facilities are impressive and this does not include the countless hours spent with the professional community, public information and all other aspects of the AA service structure.

Each quarter the Group has an "outing" which is an

excuse to share a good meal and AA fellowship.
