Putting the spotlight on our morning meetings!



Eleven years ago a few men got together and formed the 7:30 Am "Sunrise Group" at the Aberdeen Building. The following article was written by one of those men at that time:

"As the early morning rays of sunlight flickered through the windows of the meeting room the leader opened the first gathering of the Sunday Sunrise Group with the Serenity Prayer.

It was a perfect sunrise on the threshold of the winter season. It was as if the hand of God had placed the sun and the window exactly where they belonged for the start of the new group.

Only five AA members were present, but, not surprisingly, the group conscience was at peace with the diminutive number of attendees seated around the kitchen table.

Today, despite some crowding, the Sunrise Group still meets in the kitchen, yet everyone always feels comfortable.

The discussion is grounded in the Big Book and the 12 Steps. The topic is presented in the form of a

question. Each participant answers the question with his or her personal experience.

Not unusual is the laughter and good cheer as both newcomers and old-timers share their stories. Quite appropriately the stories portray the solution to the question of recovery rather than languishing in the problem of alcoholism. The Sunrise Group is a comfort to sober alcoholics who dwell with God.

The Sunrise Group is a closed discussion meeting and meets at 7:30 AM Sundays at the Aberdeen Building.

With the advent of "The Early Risers Group" we now have morning meetings every day of the week!

If you are an early riser this is the meeting for you. Ever since it began the "Early Risers Group" has been host to a large group of AA members needing a good head start to the day. The format is a closed discussion and the group conscience defined the meeting's purpose as:

"The Early Risers Group values the presence of everyone and believes that <u>each</u> of us sharing our experience, strength and hope is important to <u>everybody</u>. Whether we have days, weeks or months of sobriety or many years, our experience will always be a tremendous source of strength and hope for others. We encourage everyone to contribute."

Anyone with a desire to stop drinking is welcome. The "Early Risers Group" regulars represent a broad cross section of sobriety, ranging from newcomers to those with many years and the group thrives on the sharing of their individual experience.

Early morning can present some scheduling demands for the working alcoholic so coming late or having to leave early to honor work hours is OK and requires no apology.

We meet at the Aberdeen building at 7:30 am, Monday through Saturday and look forward to meeting and getting to know you

Thus we rarely ended a discussion without him giving me a task of some sort and I had to decide whether or not I would perform it. Over the years I learned he was much more interested in my willingness than in the quality of my performance.

One such task was to read the Big Book in its entirety, over the next two weeks (there was always a dead-line!) and list all the promises which I found.

I have always been grateful for this kind of sponsorship and trust that these "other" promises will bring you the serenity & courage which they've brought to me.

"I have seen hundreds of families set their feet in the path that really goes somewhere; have seen the most impossible, domestic situations righted: feuds & bitterness of all sorts wiped out. I have seen men come out of asylums & resume a vital place in the lives of their families & communities. **Business and professional** men have regained their standing. There is scarcely any form of trouble and misery which has not been overcome among us."



Mine started innocently


enough with alcohol, which led to my life becoming unmanageable. It was, and is, only by the Grace of God and the AA program that I am not dead today.



Then it came. The email I was waiting for with SB 50 in the subject line. "This is to confirm that your application is complete and going to the NFL for processing and FBI background check." Hmmm, were my years in college going to catch up to me and keep me from going? No, it was expunged and I was confirmed in January. I would be selling programs at SB 50 & able to see the Panthers vs the Broncos. Oh my, what an amazing opportunity!

Then it hit me ...I was going to the biggest beer sponsored event in the U.S. Super Bowl was once synonymous with the Bud Bowl. How did I feel about this? Time to talk to my sponsor. With a plan we agreed I could do this. She had more confidence in me than I did. I was a sneaky drunk...if no

one saw me it didn't happen. I'm glad I came to the realization that all it took was for God and me to know. As February drew near we continued to talk about the plan... admitting I was an alcoholic going to the biggest excuse to drink on a Sunday needed to be in the forefront of my mind.

Finally the time had arrived, my adventure to my favorite city and birthplace would be happening. I was able to take a few days to tour San Francisco before training for the event. The weather was perfect for sight seeing and I stuck to the plan. I started each day as I do here, prayers & meditation ... reach out to another alcoholic and my sponsor on a daily basis and end each day with gratitude for another 24 and prayers.

The fastest way to be relieved of my duties would be to drink while in uniform and while wearing credentials. At 6 am we were shuttled from one security check at Avaya Stadium thru 3 more at Levi Stadium, dogs and tanks included.

The calm before the opening of the gates is one of my favorite parts. Watching the players of both teams come out in regular clothes to check it out, security checking, checking & checking & media setting up but letting the athletes be. To have a hot chocolate in the first row on the 50 yard line and another in the highest seat up, best Swiss Miss ever !!! To leisurely stroll around the stadium knowing that the biggest football event in history was preparing to take place. I didn't notice it at the time but I wasn't thinking about drinking. I was there in the moment soaking up every bit of experience.

Then the gates opened, crowds rushed in & the noise elevated. Energy was building, seas of orange & light blue flooding. Trying to sell out programs before Lady GaGa went on stage, getting caught up with the excitement, a little tingle of claustrophobia.



Bill W. & The Oxford Group

The origin of AA can be traced to the Oxford Group, a religious movement then popular in the United States and Europe.

A well-to-do Vermonter named Rowland H. was able to get sober by attending Oxford Group meetings in New York City. They were held at the Calvary Church under the leader-

ship of the Reverend Sam Shoemaker.

Through the Oxford Group they were able to keep from drinking through a plan of self inventory, admission of wrongs, making amends, using prayer and meditation and carrying the message to others who still suffer.

One of Ebby's friends was Bill W., also a Vermonter. Ebby sought out his old friend in New York to carry his message of hope.

Bill had been ruined by chronic alcoholism and wad considered helpless. After he heard Ebby's story he once again entered Towns Hospital for treatment.

On Dec. 11th, 1935, Ebby visited Bill at Towns Hospital and shared his spiritual journey of recovery.

After Ebby left, Bill underwent a powerful spiritual experience. Although not religious, Bill experienced the miracle of freedom from the need to drink. When he asked Dr. Silkworth about the experience the "kindly little"

doctor who loved alcoholics" did not scoff but encouraged Bill to "hang on to it."

Dr. Bob, by coincidence was a Vermonter also and had already sought help from the Oxford Group.

When Bill and Dr. Bob first met in Akron, Ohio, the doctor expected to hear the rantings of an evangelistic do-gooder but instead he found himself sharing one on one with another alcoholic.

Their common background with the Oxford Group was to highly influence the AA program. However, it soon became apparent that modifications were needed if AA were to become a successful formula for the treatment of alcoholics.

Unlike the Oxford Group AA has just one purpose, the desire to stop drinking. It is this <u>Singleness of Purpose</u> that has helped to keep millions of alcoholics sober.
